Report on St. Mary's visit to South Africa June 2019





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his summer saw 45 volunteers travel to one of South Africa's poorest regions to expand the work of the multi-award winning Bambisanani Partnership charity.

Students and staff from St Mary's School, Menston, The University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University developed existing programmes and introduced new ones based on using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership in rural KwaZulu-Natal.

Over a four week period, the volunteers taught, coached and mentored hundreds of South African students in a variety of Bambisanani programmes which included sports leadership courses, cycling initiatives, sports festivals and other curriculum areas. The partnership's commitment to 'working together and learning together' proved to have a most significant positive impact on students from both countries.

The 13th annual visit by St Mary's to South Africa was led by Brad Dobson supported by Catherine Chattoe and Charlotte Wood. The St Mary's student team were Louis Adams, Tom Allan, Harmonia Ebrahim, Charlotte Falkingham, Rachel Farmer, Lydia Giedrojt, Stephen Ginty, Ciaran Hammond, Ellie Lamb, Adam Metcalfe, Lucy Moorby, Ben Patterson, Will Sammon and Isabel Wilks and they had prepared for 18 months for what would be an incredible venture and significant learning experience. These outstanding individuals were assisted by four students from Eshowe High School: Kwanele Mpanza, Sinabo Mhlongo, Aphiwe Zikhali and Nkazimulo Ndlovu. The students from Eshowe were instantly embedded as key members of the team, providing invaluable support in the way of English and Zulu language translation.

This year saw two firsts for the visit. One was the delivery of a sport for the very first time: short tennis. Four days of hard work and determination, coaching tennis, hockey and rugby, resulted in thirty Mnyakanya students prepared and eager to host and deliver the festival day to over one hundred children from Ntolwane Primary School. It was this day that saw the second of the new additions: the first ever writing festival, to accompany the outstanding annual sports and reading festivals.

Additionally, as part of the visit, St Mary's students delivered lessons to Mnyakanya students, covering a whole host of subjects from across the curriculum. This year saw a range of imaginative teaching strategies used in the delivery of the lessons. A velcro body suit was used to teach the bones of the body and an erupting volcano as part of a geography lesson was delivered by St. Mary's head boy, Tom Allan and his teaching partner, Charlotte Falkingham. The lessons were full of enthusiastic Mnyakanya learners and teachers from both countries praised the students for the exceptional quality of their work.

Annual recognition is given to South African students, celebrating exceptional leadership qualities displayed throughout the programme. Mnyakanya students received their much deserved Leadership awards and students from Mnyakanya and Ntolwane Primary school were presented with a series of annual awards from the John Paul II Foundation for Sport and the Lawrie McCauley awards for football and creative writing, as part of the special celebration bringing the work at Mnyakanya High School to a close for another year.

Volunteer work at uMlalazi Day Centre and Crèche completed the visit to South Africa. The day centre is for orphans and vulnerable children run by the Zulufadder Children's Trust, led by Popi and her team. The students organised a range of games, singing and 'story sacks', consisting of various props to bring their exciting books to life. This was a special way to end the visit for the students, and one that will remain fondly in their memories.

UMLALAZI DAY CENTRE AND CRECHE (FORMERLY ZULUFADDER ORPHANAGE)

The final day was spent at uMlalazi Day Centre and Creche. uMlalazi Day Centre is a charitable organisation that promotes education and self-reliance among young people from rural communities in South Africa. It works to provide support to orphans with a day crèche and support through primary school and onto further education. Their work is vital, especially in the Kwa-Zulu Natal region with the highest rate of HIV and AIDS in the world. This centre works hard at giving back a childhood that these children deserve.

The St. Mary's students had prepared story sacks. Animal masks, teddies, sparkly party hats and whistles brought the stories to life. Everyone loved hearing The Hungry Caterpillar story. St. Mary's helped with the centres' gardening project by helping to plant and water lettuces in their vegetable plot.


Adam Metcalfe and Ben Patterson wrote a blog post for this special day:

SPECIAL REPORT:

TRANSFORMING LEARNING AT MNYAKANYA HIGH SCHOOL

Students at a school in one of South Africa's most deprived rural areas have access to the internet for the first time thanks to three years of international collaboration.

The Bambisanani Partnership which was started 13 years ago by St. Mary's School, Menston, and Mnyakanya High School in KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa, has worked with the Rotary Club of Aireborough and Eshowe Rotary Club in South Africa to secure funding of £30,000 to create the computer based classroom at Mnyakanya High School.

Aireborough Rotary Club committed £10,000 towards the project and after a rigorous process of grant applications, further funding was approved by Rotary International.

The purpose built classroom which will transform education at the remote rural school finally opened this month. It has full internet connectivity for 20 modern computers with associated software and additional hardware, including projector and screen. The grant money will also fund significant training for teaching staff together with technical support and connectivity fees for the next five years.

A delighted Catherine Chattoe, Bambisanani co-ordinator at St. Mary's, said: "This is a great achievement for The Bambisanani Partnership, Aireborough Rotary Club and Eshowe Rotary Club. Providing 20 computers and access to the internet will make such a difference to the students and teachers at Mnyakanya High School.

"The teachers will be able to use the facility to improve their teaching and students will be able to use the computers to aid their learning and access valuable information that may impact on their futures."

The Secretary of the Rotary Club of Aireborough, Graham Davies, added: "We are pleased to have been able to facilitate the funding of this project which we know will have a massive positive impact on the lives of both the students and the teaching staff at the school.

"In conjunction with the Bambisanani Partnership, we look forward to seeing how they have all progressed."

The Media Centre is known as 'Mary's Room' with respect to St. Mary's School and to Mary Jowett, who left a legacy to Aireborough Rotary Club which helped to fund the project.

The Rotary District Governor in KwaZulu-Natal Jaco Stander visited the school to officially open the new facility. Ronnie Ngeleka, Principal at Mnyakanya, said: "We thank everybody concerned for the new Media Centre which will help transform our school for both learners and educators.

"We have already applied to the Department of Education to introduce Computer Application Technology as a subject across all grades to ensure that our learners are well equipped to face the real world and play their part in it."









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
